2017-18 INSIGHTS INTO YOUR CASB MEMBERSHIP IN MOTION

GREAT SCHOOLS, THRIVING COMMUNITIES BALLOT INITIATIVE

CASB is supporting the effort to get an increase in public education funding on the November 2018 ballot. The push for this ballot initiative must be locally focused and clearly articulate the benefit to the district and the impact on the local taxpayers and economy if the initiative passes. To support this effort, the CASB Board approved a one-time investment to develop and distribute communication tools and resources for local school boards.

GAINS ON SCHOOL FINANCE

Budget forecasts expect additional funds available in 2018-19. Colorado has been fortunate, thanks to a revenue increase due to the state's strong economic growth and the federal government broadening what is taxable.


The Budget Stabilization Factor, formerly known as the Negative Factor, is currently \$830 million. CASB asked for a \$250 million buy down. As we go to press with the annual report, staff believes at least \$150 million will go towards the buy down, making this the largest single-year buy down since budget stabilization began. It also looks to be unlikely that school districts or teachers will incur new costs as a result of PERA reform.

Although much of our advocacy work primarily focused on fiscal problems, we have also continued to monitor State Board rulemaking and regulations. On several occasions, our testimony to the State Board resulted in substantial improvement to proposed new rules.

NEW ROOTS FOR CASB

In March 2017, CASB moved to its new office space in a renovated building that also houses the Colorado Association of School Executives. The two organizations share conference room space on the first floor. Plans are under discussion to create an additional conference room and to build a studio for webinar, video and podcast production.

The new office will help us better serve our members and support future CASB efforts to enhance our leadership development program. It will also allow us to offer a variety of learning opportunities and onsite workshops for board members and superintendents.

HIGHLIGHTS OF YOUR CASB MEMBERSHIP

POLICY

CASB's policy team provides guidance, information and updated sample policies and regulations affected by federal and state legislation. Key issues in 2017-18 included the Every Student Succeeds Act, Claire Davis School Safety Act and the use of restraint and seclusion.

- 165 districts, 18 BOCES and 5 Attorney Council members participated in CASB's Policy Support System.
- ✓ 27 member districts used CASB's Online District Policy Maintenance Service, which manages local board policies.
- Staff conducted 17-plus complimentary Policy Audits that provided feedback on the effectiveness of local policy manuals.
- 9 member districts contracted for Policy Manual Overhaul Projects, an in-depth review and update of local policies.

Groundbreaking

Countless hours of collaboration, planning and strategizing are coming to life via school groundbreakings, blueprint renderings, hard hat tours and new family welcome sessions.

ADVOCACY

Throughout the year, CASB's advocacy team represented – and helped protect – the best interests of local school boards during hundreds of interactions with education organizations, political leaders, legislators and business leaders.

Highlights

- Monitored proposed legislation and provided feedback to legislators and stakeholder groups on bills, including charter school appeals, concurrent enrollment and service areas, truancy and discipline of preschool through second grade students.
- More than 185 people signed up for CASB's Digital Advocacy Network, resulting in 1,200-plus connections with legislators.
- 100 students headed to the Capitol for CASB's Student Days at the Capitol.
- Received 23 member-initiated resolutions for consideration at the Delegate Assembly.
- ✓ Hit the road for a school tour highlighting programs in Colorado Springs D-11, Peyton 23-Jt and Academy District 20.

LEGAL

Board member roles and responsibilities. Colorado's open meetings law and open records act. Employment. Conflicts of interest. Student data privacy and discipline. CASB's legal team provided support and consultation on these topics, with a special focus on ensuring members have 24/7 access to resources.

The team also:

- Populated the online Learning Center with legal memos and information.
- Supported school district interests by filing an amicus curiae brief on the constitutionality of the Taxpayers' Bill of Rights.
- ✓ Broadcast a school board election seminar in collaboration with the Colorado Secretary of State's office and posted the video on the CASB website.
- Provided legal support for Superintendent Search service.

COMMUNICATIONS & EVENTS

Attendance at the **2017 CASB Convention** increased by 8.72 percent from 2016, bringing the total number of participants to 1,097. Our first-ever Wi-Fi sponsor covered the cost of providing online access to all convention attendees, while student artists, photographers and videographers impressed attendees with their creativity and skillfulness.

The **2018 Winter Conference** saw a bump in attendance and rollout of the new sponsor and exhibitor program.

We revamped the **Partnership Program** to offer more flexibility for participation and to help foster relationships with our partners, sponsors and exhibitors.

A new **Community Insights** section of our website spotlights grant opportunities and other news relevant to school districts.

CASB started developing a robust **Leadership Development Program** to meet the varying needs of our members.

MEMBER RELATIONS

CASB's Director of Member Relations traveled 14,000-plus miles, held 66 phone meetings and spent 30 nights in hotels across Colorado – all in support of our members and to help them strengthen the effectiveness and relevance of their board.
